

Anyone know where Intragam comes from?

It is simple really - from blood donations and lots of them! Intragam is made exclusively from voluntary blood donations and is made by CSL Limited from plasma collected from Australian donations- there are no overseas donations used in the manufacture of this all-important product. Many of the patients that battle CIDP and GBS rely



on Intragam as a key weapon to fight this condition. How many times have you heard someone say that they have had less Intragam because there is not enough available?

You can help. We need people to make more blood donations. Over 12,000 individual plasma donations are pooled together to produce each batch of Intragam One donation of whole blood makes over 13 different products ranging from red blood cells, platelets, Albumex-20, prothrombinex and of course Intragam.

As a group that relies heavily on blood donations we want to encourage all our family members and friends to make blood donations. In support of this, The IN Group has joined the Red Cross - Summer Blood Challenge for 1999.

History of the Blood Challenge

In the summer of 1979, the Motorcycle Riders Association (MRA) issued a challenge to other organisations to give more blood than the state's motorcyclists did during the three months of summer.

The MRA recognised that summer, and particularly the Christmas holiday period, can be a difficult time for the Blood Service, with an increased demand for blood while fewer people donate.

Their challenge was met by a few groups including the Scouts and Police. These groups have maintained their support and enthusiasm for the challenge over the last 21 years, building the Summer Challenge into a well recognised annual community event. This is the first year the IN Group has participated but we recognise the reliance on blood donations for our well-being and are wanting to be active in this area.

Summer Blood Challenge 1999-2000

The 21st Summer Blood Challenge will run from 1 December 1999 until 28 February 2000. The blood bank are particularly looking for groups to donate as much blood as possible over the New Year period.

How can you be a part of the Summer Blood Challenge and help the IN Group make a mark in the Challenge?

It is easy. All you have to do is register a donation for the IN Group when you next donate or when you take the very easy step of your first donation. There are forms available at the refreshment area at all Blood Service venues. Please ask staff if you require assistance.

All our donations are collated and awards are presented to groups that have the most donors, the most new donors and an Ambassador Award. (Certificates of participation will be presented to all groups).

So are you convinced yet?

You've heard the advertisements - only 3% of Victorian are donating blood!! This is not enough blood for CIDP/GBS battlers to receive optimum levels of products such as Intragam. How many times have you heard someone say "I turned up for my fortnightly treatment of Intragam, only to find that I was getting less again as there has not been enough blood donated to make more Intragam". How can we ignore this?

We are trying to do our bit by encouraging our **family and friends** to make donations and lots of them! **Can you help us???** (You are probably aware that present sufferers and people over 65 years old are not eligible to donate their blood. If in any doubt ring 13 14 95.)

Intragam again in short supply

A number of our members have in recent weeks not received the Intragam prescribed for their GBS or CIDP treatment or else been given a reduced amount.

I contacted Dr Neil Boyce, Director of the Victorian Branch of the Australian Red Cross Blood Service who confirmed a current shortfall. He did not expect that the medical demand for Intragam would be met until the Review Of the Australian Blood Banking and Plasma Product Sector, chaired by Sir Ninian Stephen, has made its report to the Federal Government. This could be 12 to 24 months away.

Dr Boyce was not confident that there would be any major increase in the output of Intragam by mid 2000 through CSL improved production as had been suggested.

The report by the AHMAC Working Committee may be announced before the end of this year. If this happens, it is expected that the categorisation of CIDP will be raised fro B priority to A which will be greatly helpful to CIDP patients.

An Inexcusable Crisis

I had a call from **WAYNE CASTLEMAN** of Bald Hills, Victoria advising that his 65 year old father Phillip, living in Mildura, had been stricken with GBS such that he had been flown to Adelaide and placed in Intensive Care at the Royal Adelaide Hospital. Wayne asked if we could supply any information about GBS. I said we would do that and also try and arrange through the SA Neurological Centre somebody who had been through the GBS experience to visit his father. I also

arranged for our GBS experienced member, Keith Colwill, to speak to Wayne and his wife. The SA Centre organised a visit to his father by Pauline Major who had suffered from GBS.

Wayne and his wife showed their appreciation of this support by joining The In Group, enclosing a generous donation and sending a warm letter of thanks to me.

Some weeks later I received another call from Wayne expressing his great concern that he had heard there had been talk at the hospital of turning off the ventilator that enabled his father to breathe.

This was horrifying news and I rang the hospital and talked with their neurological registrar. I told him of our grave concern of any idea of turning off a GBS patient's ventilator and how we had a number of members who had spent many months under ventilation being treated in Intensive Care for GBS and had made recoveries. The registrar checked and advised there had been possibly some talk within Intensive Care about turning off the ventilator but there would be no further consideration of any such action.

It is pleasing to report that Phillip Castleman is making slow but good recovery. Let us hope we never hear of talk of any such action in the future at any hospital.
